President's Corner

Bucks County has a particularly rich tradition of art and culture. Early 19th century folk and decorative paintings depicted the resident's lives and historical events. Later in that century, skilled artists progressed to formal portraits of contemporaries and landscapes of the rapidly changing countryside. In the first half of the 20th century, many established artists, writers, and artisans moved to the region having been attracted by affordable real estate, the relaxed rural lifestyle, and proximity to New York. To this day, art flourishes in Bucks County and there are many very accomplished artists.

The young Joseph Pavone grew up in Bucks County and was surely influenced by the artistic atmosphere of the region. He was quoted as saying "I was always interested in art ever since I was a baby. [I] used to draw ever

since I can remember, I drew my way through school." After graduating from Bristol High School, Pavone continued developing his artistic skills by studying with German painter, Helmut Meyer-Weingarten, and gaining degrees from Temple University's Tyler School of Art. In 1961, Pavone founded the Radcliffe Art Gallery in a converted carriage house on Franklin Street where he exhibited other artists' work, taught, and provided a gathering space for people interested in art. BCHF grew out of the gallery experience when it became clear to Pavone and others that there was a need for an organization that could stimulate community support and appreciation of the arts and culture that existed in this area.

While BCHF's mission includes providing cultural opportunities for the community, the Grundy Foundation

realized that the many artists in and around Bristol needed more. They needed an organization that would provide opportunities for artists to exhibit their works to the public and to exchange ideas and information. As a result, the Grundy Foundation founded Artists of Bristol on the Delaware (AOB) in 2006. Since its founding, AOB has tirelessly worked to fulfill its goals. It has organized and managed exhibitions in a variety of venues including Lower Bucks Hospital, Margaret R. Grundy Library, Lower Bucks Community College, Calm Waters, Center For the Arts, and Silver Lake Nature Center. They have supported their member artists by providing exhibition materials and publicizing member's achievements, honors, and shows. In addition, they have educated both their members and the public with talks at their monthly meetings and in outreach programs and courses. Currently, AOB is striving to establish a permanent gallery so that artists have a stable space to display their art and enthusiasts and buyers have predictable access to that art.

AOB and BCHF have a natural affiliation; our goals

are compatible, and we have worked synergistically on many occasions. For many years on Historic Bristol Day (HBD), AOB members have set up a day long exhibition and they have judged the Children's Art Contest. This year and next, we are going to expand our collaboration. On HBD 2022, we will be holding a silent auction for a fabulous abstract by award winning artist and AOB president, Rose Marie Strippoli (more details are available in this edition). At the BCHF Annual Meeting on November 16, 2022, well known mosaicist Patricia Buchanan will present a talk about her art. Next April, 2023, AOB and BCHF will be jointly presenting an art exhibit at the BCHF headquarters starting with an opening reception. We hope these efforts will stimulate the community's interest in the artist's work and encourage the artists to continue to create.

The organizing committee of the 46th Annual Historic Bristol Day is dedicating the day in honor of Catherine McCarry who passed away on June 30 of this year. McCarry was a lifelong Bristol Borough resident and an active BCHF board member for numerous years. She volunteered in a variety of capacities over the years taking part in the Peach Social, the annual Tea and First Night. In the late 2000s she chaired Historic Bristol Day. Catherine will always be remembered for her dedication to this organization.



Archaeological Excavation on Historic Bristol Day at Friends Meeting House

We are excited to continue excavations at the Friends Meeting House which were suspended for a few years due to the pandemic. This year's archaeological dig will build on prior efforts conducted in the grassy yard around the Friends Meeting House at the corner of Wood and Market Streets. Preliminary research revealed that the building was originally built between 1711 and 1713, with a number of changes since that time. Historical photographs and maps showed no other buildings were built on the property that might have disturbed fragile archaeological remains. The large sycamore tree next to the building is also quite old and suggests that the yard has long been an open area. The Friends (Quakers) are enthusiastically supportive of the project and gave their permission to proceed.

Earlier excavations at this property found a stone wall and a variety of artifacts such as window glass, fragments of brick mortar, smoking pipe fragments, ceramic plate fragments, and a large piece of coral. Many of the artifacts date from the nineteenth century.

On October 15, 2022, excavation units measuring five foot by five foot square will be opened to allow for the public to learn professional archaeological excavation techniques.





The following items were excerpted from **October 1912** issues of THE DAILY COURIER.

10/3 – SCHOOL BOARD HAS MONTHLY MEETING. Fear of Vaccination Bars Children. Twelve Pupils Refuse to Be Inoculated and Are Turned Away.

Prices 25c to \$2.50 the garment. Sweaters – 50c to \$5.50. Clothing made-to-measure; suits and overcoats - \$13.50 and up to \$40.00.”

10/5 – “Attention! Fifth Ward Republicans. A Club Will Be Organized by the Fifth Ward Republicans on Monday Evening, October 7 th , in the Store Property at the Corner of Jefferson Ave. & Chestnut St. All Republicans Are Invited to Be Present, and to Participate in the Organization.”

T.B. & P. CARS BEING OVERHAULED. Car number 15 of the upper division of the Trenton, Bristol and Philadelphia Street Railway appeared in service yesterday newly painted and gilded and equipped with new rattan-covered seats of the latest design, with handles to turn them over. The rolling stock of this line is steadily being improved for the comfort and convenience of the traveling public.

10/11 – OX ROAST IS GREAT SUCCESS. Close to

1,000 people saw the Rev. J. V. Peyton of the Bristol A.M.E. Church conduct the novel ox roast at Pythian Hall on Thursday evening. From three in the afternoon ‘til late at night, the hall was crowded with colored people from Bristol and surrounding towns. The church’s pastor is “champion of America” when it comes to reducing a whole ox to a palatable state before an open fire.

10/16 – ST. JAMES WILL HAVE A RECTOR. The parishioners and vestry of St. James Church met with the Rev. W. C. Emhardt of Newtown on Monday evening to consider the question of obtaining a rector for the local church.

A number of Bristol passengers on the steamer “Bristol” were somewhat frightened on Tuesday when an accident occurred to the boat at the Burlington wharf. The “Bristol” and the “Springfield” jammed together and caused the mishap.

10/22 – SWASTIKA WILL GIVE PRIVATE PRODUCTION. The Swastika society of the Bristol High School, this evening at a private meeting in assembly hall, will present an amateur musical comedy entitled “Madame Sherry,” under the direction of Erwyn Horn. Cast members include: Betty Smith, Erwyn Horn, Harold Vandegrift, Gilbert Lovett, Lillian Adams and George Musnuff.

10/23 – CLUBS WILL UNITE FOR HUGE PARADE. The first joint meeting of the five ward committees was held on Tuesday evening in the headquarters of the First Ward Club to perfect

HALLOWEEN

Topeka, Kansas, claims to have the first Halloween celebration in the United States by hosting in 1895 the oldest Halloween parade in the country.

During the 1940s, what did the Halloween parade look like in Bristol Borough? Orange and black were the colors of the day. Store windows on Mill St. were painted by school children and the merchants chose the best window paintings.

Orange pumpkins made of construction paper and crafted by the children trimmed their classrooms. Colorful paper chains handmade by the children decorated the bulletin board. In those days, children walked home for lunch. Once lunch was over, the children donned their costumes. Most of the children, including myself, wore homemade costumes. Our masks we bought from McCrory's 5 & 10 store located on the corner of Mill and Wood Sts.

Our 5th-grade teacher brought her dog after lunch and sat him in a seat. We didn't sit in our regular seats because we wanted to confuse her. Later, she would try to guess our identities. Then the main event, The PARADE! We lined up and went outside to parade down Bath St. as far as Kay's Bakery and then back to school. Along the way parents, other family members and friends often stood and watched as we marched along. Once back in the



classroom, we sat in any chair that we wanted so the teacher could begin guessing who was who. Finally, we had some refreshments. The bell rang, and it was time to go home.

At home, after supper, we put our costumes on again and went outside to various houses in our neighborhood. My favorite costume was as a clown. We knocked on doors and would say, "Trick or Treat," after which we were invited inside, where our neighbors tried to guess who was behind the mask.

Each of us carried a bag or plastic pumpkin for our "treats." We would get spice cookies, pretzels, small candies like Hersey's Kisses, hard candies, apples, and occasionally a tiny cup of apple cider.



We saw windows and porches with paper chains, paper cutout pumpkins, and even real pumpkins carved as frightful faces with a bright candle inside. When it was time to go home, we hurried inside and emptied our treats onto the table to see what was inside.

The next day, for the Christian community, November 1st, was All Saints Day.

Halloween! Happy memories for this writer.
