Story of an Uncle and Nephew: Michael Dougherty and James P. Lawler By Harold Mitchener

If you go to the Canal Lagoon on Jefferson Avenue you can find a statue of Michael Dougherty.

He came from Ireland to Bristol in time for the American Civil War. He entered the military when President Lincoln called for volunteers. Since he was Irish, he found a group from Ireland and stayed with them. He was captured and put in Andersonville Prison. He suffered much as did the others in that prison. While in prison he kept a diary. When the war ended, he was set free and boarded a steamboat on the Mississippi River heading north. The steamboat was called the Sultana. A fire on the craft caused it to sink. He and his diary managed to reach dry land, and he finally made his way back to Bristol.

He married in St. Mark's Church and the couple had several children. He was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, and he was also elected to the Borough Council.

He is buried in St. Mark Cemetery on Radcliffe St.

In Bristol he had a son who was a printer, and he had him make a copy of the diary. The diary can be found in the Margaret R. Grundy Library in Bristol and in the Military Archives in Washington, D. C. to read this diary online.

One of Michael Dougherty's nephews became a medical doctor. His name was James P. Lawler. Lawler was born in Bristol on December 11, 1894. He attended public school in Bristol and graduated from Bristol High School. He lived at 591 Bath Street. He attended Pre-Medical Dept. at Hahnemann Medical College, (1923-1925). He graduated in 1930 and completed an internship at Hahnemann Medical college in Philadelphia and was licensed in Pennsylvania in 1930. Dr. Lawler became a member of the Bucks County Medical Society and with both Hahnemann Medical College Hospital and Nazareth Hospital in Philadelphia. While in general practice he studied a specialty in Psychiatry. He served in World War I for nine months in the infantry.

Dr. Lawler had an office a 500 Radcliffe St. He died in 1976 and is buried in St. Mark Cemetery along U. S. Route 13. He never married.

Thursday, April 10 -- The Swaminarayan Akshardham in Robbinsville, NJ, followed by a threecourse luncheon at the historic Cranberry Inn and a visit to David Bradley Chocolatier (Note: Easter is April 20!). The immense BPAS Swaminarayan is the largest Hindu temple outside of India, and sprawls over 180 acres on a campus big enough to hold six Yankee Stadiums. The Cranberry Inn has been functioning as a place to eat since the 1750s and was an alleged stop on the underground railroad. David Bradley Chocolatier has been producing gourmet hand-crafted chocolates for over 45 years. Their Easter display will set your mouth watering! The allinclusive trip cost is \$120 pp for BCHF members; \$130 for non-members. Call Jan Ruano at 215-788-2106 for flyer/reservation form or print it from our website. Thursday, June 26 -- Three-course luncheon on the Moshulu, the world's oldest and largest square-rigged sailing vessel still afloat and the one-and-only restaurant venue on a tall ship in the world today, to be followed by a tour of the magnificent Masonic Temple on Broad Street, a National Historic Landmark constructed in 1873. The all-inclusive trip cost is \$130 pp for BCHF members; \$140 for non-members. Call Helen Younglove at 215-788-9408 for flyer/reservation form or print it from our website. Wednesday, October 1 -- Eckley Miners' Village Museum in Weatherly, PA, three-course luncheon at The Inn at Jim Thorpe and free time to explore the shops in Jim Thorpe. Eckley Miners' Village is a museum that tells the story of anthracite coal mining in the region. Eckley was established in 1854 as a company-owned coal mining town. It was featured in the 1960s film "The Molly Maguires," which drew attention to it and led to its preservation as an historical site. The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission has owned and operated the preserves and interprets the history of anthracite coal mining, the lives of the miners and their families, and the evolution of the region's culture. The all-inclusive trip cost is \$125 for BCHF members; \$135 for nonmembers. Reservation info will be provided in a future issue of The Gazette.

Thursday, December 4 -- Lyndhurst Mansion, Tarrytown, NY, including a private, hot buffet lunch in the mansion. Also known as the Jay Gould Estate, the mansion sits on its own 67-acre park beside the Hudson River and is one of America's finest Gothic Revival mansions. Described as one of the "Ten Best Historic Holiday Tours" by USA Today, Lyndhurst goes all-out during the holiday season, filling the mansion with elaborate tableaus of decor. During the month of December only, the curators bring out rarely -seen items that belonged to Lyndhurst's former owners. The all-inclusive trip cost is \$158 for BCHF members; \$168 for non-members. Three Programs Lined Up

Thus far, the Ways & Means Committee has lined up three programs for 2025. Two are mostly verbal; one is an interactive program of song and history.

On **Sunday**, **February 23** (snow date - March 2), at 2 p.m. in BCHF headquarters, Kim Hanley, of the American Historical Theatre of Philadelphia, will give a 1st-person portrayal of author Harriet Beecher Stowe. Ms. Hanley is no stranger to BCHF's stage, having portrayed Annie Oakley, Alice Roosevelt Longworth and Lucretia Mott in recent years.

In 1852, Harriet Beecher Stowe published her famous novel "Uncle Tom's Cabin" or "Life Among the Lowly." This empathetic depiction of life for African Americans under slavery reached millions in the U.S. and the U.K., and helped move the conscience of the country to the great and imperative cause of abolitionism. Following her success with "Uncle Tom's Cabin," she went on to publish over 20 novels, as well as travel memoirs, home-life guides, letters and essays, becoming one of the most widely published authors in American history.

On **Sunday, March 30** (snow date - April 6), at 2 p.m., notable folksinger Mary Roth will perform "Enchanting Appalachia" at BCHF headquarters. Ms. Roth has been featured in Bucks County Magazine and has performed at many venues in Bucks and Lehigh Counties. Her performance here will be an interactive program of song and history, with a focus on the rich culture of Appalachia and its people, and include vocals, Appalachian mountain dulcimer, guitar and/or bouzouki, and the Celtic bodhran drum.

On **Tuesday, November 25**, at 7 p.m., David J. Kaplan, of Petoskey, MI, will return to BCHF's stage for another presentation on the Titanic -- this time with a different slant than done in 2023 and 2024. OUT OF THE PAST

The following items were excerpted from the Bristol Courier February 1925. Price 2¢

There are two events that were covered by papers nationwide, including the Bristol Courier on multiple occasions.

The first was the "Serum Run" across the U. S. Territory of Alaska to Nome. An epidemic of Diphtheria was developing in that community. It took 5 ½ days to transport the diphtheria antitoxin 674 miles using relay teams of sled dogs. The race began on Jan. 17th and ended on Feb. 1. Many may be familiar with this event today, known as the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race which has many traditions that commemorate the race to deliver the serum to Nome.

The second story that captivated the nation and was covered in the Bristol Courier concerned the attempts to rescue Kentucky cave explorer Floyd Collins who became trapped underground. On the 18th day the rescuers found his lifeless body.

February 3- A bill was introduced in Burlington County to construct a bridge linking Burlington and Bristol.

February 5- Michael J. McCarthy Bristol Borough Police Chief resigned. He left to become head of detectives at Fran & Seder Department Store in Philadelphia.
